

## Area Death '67

Emma Teresa Holley Manwaring, 81, widow of the late Arthur Manwaring, who resided at 410 S. Meridian Street, Blackfoot, died at her home Thursday, at 5:50 p.m. of natural causes.

She was born at Mapleton, Utah, March 14, 1886, the daughter of James Hyrum and Emma Isaac Holley. She was married to Arthur Manwaring in the Salt Lake Temple, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, on Oct. 23, 1907. In 1910 they came to Idaho and lived for many years in the Groveland community before moving to Blackfoot in 1925. Her husband died on June 1, 1942. She worked as a sales clerk for the J. C. Penny Company for a number of years.

Active in her church throughout her life, she served as a Primary president in the Groveland Ward, president of the YWMA; Gleaner leader; chorister in several organizations, especially the Relief Society Singing Mothers, for several years; and a teacher in most of the
